## New and Newish Hymns Coming!

We'll be singing many of favorites, such as "Amazing Grace" and "Beautiful Savior" in the next two months. But we're always adding new hymns to our repertoire, too. For instance, in the Sundays after Christmas we sang "That Boy-Child of Mary," a hymn set to a Malawi folk tune that was new for many of us.

**In Epiphany, we'll be singing #546 "To Be Your Presence is Our Mission." Delores Dufner** wrote the words in 2000 based on Corinthians 12 and 13, and the words celebrate our mission in Christ. This hymn is a good example of new words set to an old tune, which in this case may or may not be familiar, since we haven't sung it in many years. You may have sung the tune, Engelberg, with the words "When in Our Music God is Glorified" (#851) or "We Know that Christ is Raised" (#449). The tune was written by Charles Stanford in 1904 and is similar to the tune we sing for "For All the Saints," which was written by Stanford's student, Ralph Vaughan Williams. Watch out for the first rest (listen for the organ to play the first beat, just like "For All the Saints") and the big octave jump in the second line.


**Another new hymn, coming in Lent, is #500 "Now We Remain" by David Haas, who also** wrote #720 "We Are Called." It's a communion hymn, but it is especially fitting for Lent. You'll pick up the chorus easily, but each verse has slight variations and the 4th verse has an extra line. You'll find recordings on YouTube if you'd like to listen:

**Two other new-ish hymns coming up are #524 "What Is This Place," another old tune, this time a seventeenth-century Dutch tune, with new words translated from Dutch, which we have sung once before. We learned #330 "Seed That in Earth is Dying" last year and we'll sing it again during Lent. It's a twentieth-century Norwegian tune by Harald Herresthal with words by contemporary Norwegian Svein Ellingsen.**

The evening begins with a light Supper, prepared and served by Redeemer volunteers, in the fellowship hall. The meal is free, but donations are accepted.




## 6:00 - Godly Play



**Several of you asked for my recipe, so here it is!**

### Charlotte's Loaded Mashed Potatoes

5 lbs. potatoes, peeled

4 oz. cream cheese

6 oz. sour cream

½ stick butter or margarine

4 oz. shredded cheddar cheese

½ qt. whole milk (want creamy use half & half)

Garlic powder, add to your taste

Cook potatoes in salted water. Drain. And mash in pot. Add some milk. When half mashed add rest of ingredients. Can also use electric mixer. Add more milk if not to a soft consistency. Garnish with cheese and bacon bits on top when you take out of oven. Bake at 350° about 20 minutes until hot and steaming. Also can serve without baking.

<sup>4</sup>Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.

<sup>5</sup>Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.

<sup>7</sup>Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy.

[Jesus said:] <sup>13</sup>You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled under foot.

<sup>14</sup>You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. <sup>15</sup>No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. <sup>16</sup>In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven.

<sup>17</sup>Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets; I have come not to abolish but to fulfill. <sup>18</sup>For truly I tell you, until heaven and earth pass away, not one letter, not one stroke of a letter, will pass from the law until all is accomplished. <sup>19</sup>Therefore, whoever breaks one the least of these commandments, and teaches

others to do the same, will be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but whoever does them and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven. <sup>20</sup>For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven."

## February 16 - Sixth Sunday after Epiphany

[Jesus said to the disciples:] <sup>21</sup>You have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not murder'; and 'whoever murders shall be liable to judgment.' <sup>22</sup>But I say to you that if you are angry with a brother or sister, you will be liable to judgment; and if you insult a brother or sister, you will be liable to the council; and if you say, 'You fool,' you will be liable to the hell of fire. <sup>23</sup>So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, <sup>24</sup>leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift. <sup>25</sup>Come to terms quickly with your accuser while you are on the way to court with him, or your accuser may hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you will be thrown into prison. <sup>26</sup>Truly I tell you, you will never get out until you have paid the last penny.

<sup>27</sup>You have heard that it was said, 'You shall not commit adultery.' <sup>28</sup>But I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart. <sup>29</sup>If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to be thrown into hell. <sup>30</sup>And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to go into hell.

<sup>31</sup>It was also said, 'Whoever divorces his wife, let him give her a certificate of divorce.' <sup>32</sup>But I say to you that anyone who divorces his wife, except on the ground of unchastity, causes her to commit adultery; and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery.

<sup>33</sup>Again, you have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, 'You shall not swear falsely, but carry out the vows you have made to the Lord.' <sup>34</sup>But I say to you, Do not swear at all, either by heaven, for it is the throne of God, <sup>35</sup>or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. <sup>36</sup>And do not swear by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. <sup>37</sup>Let your word be 'Yes, Yes' or 'No, No'; anything more than this comes from the evil one."

# Creation Care News

## What's Your Resolve for New Year's? How about helping out our EARTH by recycling Plastic Film?

Plastic film in many forms is some of the trash that most recycling centers won't take, but can be taken to Dillion/Kroger and Target stores in Salina for recycling. See graphic for specifics. What do bubble wrap, plastic overwrap around paper towels, cereal box liners and bread bags all have in common? They're all recyclable! In fact, the list doesn't end there: dry cleaning bags, produce bags, newspaper sleeves, plastic shipping envelopes, clean sandwich bags – so many things which, not too many years ago, would have been tossed in the garbage, are now able to be turned into something new!

### How Can YOU Be a Zero Hero?

A Zero Hero is someone who steps up for change when it comes to reducing waste. Even small changes that require small effort can make you a Zero Hero!

**One recommendation: in addition to your curbside or container recycling (the items that are picked up by the local waste company), set up a separate recycling bin for plastic packaging in your home, collecting these once-discarded items over time. When the bin is full, take it to your local grocery store on your next shopping trip and place it in the drop-off bins – it's that easy!**

### How Does The Kroger Co. Recycle Plastic?

Once you drop off those plastic bags and packaging in our bin, where does it go? Our stores collect this single-use plastic packaging from you and combine it with other plastic packaging used in-store; everything is sent away to be made into composite decking. Over the past three years, the Zero Hunger | Zero Waste program has recycled more than 180 million pounds of plastic. That's a lot of decking! It's true that heroes don't typically know they're heroes. But it's also true that you can set an example for others *and* change the world with actions that might seem small and insignificant. By recycling your plastic bags and packaging, you're contributing to a world with fewer plastics and less waste. You're a Zero Hero, and we think you should be wearing a cape!


